## PROFILE – Ken Eason

Ken Eason was a South London lad, growing up on the streets of Lambeth. Football was important to him, playing at school and developing his skills, as a left half or inside left, until, at 16 years old he was selected for the South London team. When playing for South London, a scout offered a trial, to Ken and two fellow players, with Walthamstow Avenue, of the Isthmian League. Ken impressed and subsequently signed, working his way through the teams up to the Reserves. Ken had started work as a driver for a Fleet Street newspaper and found he could earn great money by working nights,

something that didn't fit with the demands of football. After 20 years old, Ken's football was with Sunday and pub teams. In one of these teams, Ken played with the father of Glyn Hodges and young Glyn was often on the touchline, watching. (Many of you will know Glyn as an ex-Wimbledon player and manager: currently he is Assistant Manager at Bradford City).

As well as playing football, as a kid, Ken went along to Cold Blow Lane, to watch Millwall, until he was taken along to Craven Cottage and watched Fulham win 6-0. So, Ken became a Fulham supporter for life ( over 60 years, so far).

Ken has been married three times. He has four daughters altogether and one son (Ken says that the son is no problem!). Wife number two was Brenda and with her he moved to Sevenoaks and gave up his regular wage, becoming an entrepreneur, firstly running a petrol station and car sales and later an Estate Agent, opposite the Blue Dolphin in Hastings. Ken has bought, renovated and sold properties for many years and is now in living in Crowhurst and doing-up that house.

In 1996 Bobby Robson was appointed manager of

Barcelona. Ken wrote him a letter, wishing him luck in his new job and saying that he and Brenda hoped to visit Barcelona at the end of the season, in the hope of them being crowned La Liga champions. In return Bobby Robson sent back a letter of four or five pages and as the end of the season approached, phoned Ken, to arrange a visit to Camp Nou. Unfortunately, Fabio Capella's Real Madrid beat Barcelona to the title, that year. Ken and Brenda were treated royally. Bobby's wife had left Spain and gone back to Ipswich, so Bobby shared his house in Sitges with Ken and Brenda, for a few days and remained friends for the rest of his life.

Ken has been playing walking football since 2018. It was Paul Sutton who first persuaded him to come along. Ken's friendship with Paul started after Ken was in hospital and nursed by Mary, Paul's wife and Ken was able to offer a break at a property that he owned in Cornwall.
