Borough progressed to the third round of the WFA National Cup over 50s with a victory over fellow Southern Combination rivals Hastings United on a wet day at Priory Lane. The visitors were favourites, as they had beaten the home side twice in the league encounters, but the home side started on the front foot and created a couple of early opportunities which gave them belief that there was chance to get something from the game. The team showed changes from the league squad with Steve Over and Darren Shoesmith playing and they were combining to good effect supported by Ben Trowell and Mark Reed. Another change was Richard Brook playing in an unfamiliar role at the back where he performed very well. As expected the visitors began to create chances of their own and Tony Edwards, in the Borough goal, made some superb stops to thwart them, one particular interception with his leg

to cut out a cross, prevented what would have been a tap in at the far post. Borough were also threatening at the other end and could have gone ahead but fell behind towards the end of the first half when a low drive finally beat the home keeper.

Although trailing the home team responded well and equalised a few minutes later when a shot from Mark Reed deflected over the goalkeeper.

The second period produced a game which ebbed and flowed as both teams went for the win and it was Borough who struck early in the half when Mark Reed scored his second of the game with a powerful drive set up by Steve Over. Hastings responded to this goal and had several chances to draw level but, as in the first half, found Tony Edwards difficult to beat as he made a string of fine saves to deny them a leveller. John Kemp replaced Mark Reed with eight minutes left and he put the game out of the visitors reach with a composed close range finish. Hastings, to their credit, kept going to the end to try and rescue the game but the home team held out for a fine victory. The second round sees Borough get a bye so they await their next opponents in round three.
